How can Housing First be a tool for systemic change?



It's about governance.





Housing First: policy...or governance?

At its core, HF is a new model for the governance of homelessness characterised by a radical goal:

. Eliminating, rather than just managing homelessness.

To seize its potential, advocates should not focus on designing a perfect roadmap or blueprint for its implementation – as if HF is not a goal in itself, or a one-size-fits-all policy.

Instead, they can work to ensure that ungoverned homelessness phenomena become governed.




Housing First: policy...or governance?


HF as policy	HF as governance
From focusing on developing a "one-size-fits-all" blueprint	to ensuring that practitioners can learn by doing how to solve implementation problems
From focusing on the assessment of resources needed for implementing HF	to actively bringing key stakeholders (local and national) on board
From supplying valuable but resource-intensive policy ideas	to fostering the long-term commitment of politics towards <i>eliminating</i> homelessness








What are the implications of a governance approach to HF?









Call to action: Key recommendations

To ensure directionality...

- Believe it when you say it: homelessness can be ended.
- Secure high-level political commitment by building incentives and pressure for decision-makers.
- Advocate to adjust the incentives for the previous legacy of service providers, so as to ensure that: (i) moving from shelter-based to permanent housing pays off for them as well; and (ii) person-centred planning is prioritised.

To ensure capacity building...

- Prevent fragmentation of practitioners and groundworkers' initiatives through training and peer learning.
- Engage with all stakeholders that may help securing key human or financial resources for HF deployment.
- Prevent isolation of HF initiatives by governing networks of actors committed to ending homelessness
 and not just stakeholders committed to HF.

To ensure learning...

- Commit to action rather than detailed ex ante planning.
- Direct research resources into ex post evaluations to strengthen the knowledge base.
- Balance decentralised autonomy of local networks implementing HF with centralised diffusion of lessons learnt.
- Create broader appetite for HF philosophy by promotion of a captivating narrative.
